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A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear committee members, supporters and friends,

As our chapter in 2023 comes to a close, we look back upon the remarkable achievements and progress that Sarawak Children's Cancer Society (SCCS) has made together as a community dedicated to fighting childhood cancer. We take this opportunity to not only reflect on but also acknowledge the continuous efforts to improve accessibility to the best available treatment and care for families of children with cancer.

As one of Malaysia's leading non-profit organisations that advocate for childhood cancer, 2023 was a year of milestones. Some of our key achievements include being a part of the founding organisations to kickstart Childhood Cancer Malaysia (CCM), hosting the 15th Childhood Cancer International (CCI) Asia Conference in Kuching and facilitating the donation of medical equipment totalling over RM360,000 to Sarawak General Hospital (SGH) and Bintulu Hospital.

Additionally, infrastructural upgrades at Sibu Hospital, Bintulu Hospital and the Kuching Halfway Home Centre seek to secure a more comfortable and conducive environment for both children and their families during their challenging journeys.

These initiatives, together with other support services saw an expenditure in 2023 of RM2.02 million, with 68% of the total expenses allocated for essential support services, accommodation, financial and medical aid, education, and recreation.

2023 AT A GLANCE

JANUARY

Created a framework of measurable and achievable goals to enhance our support of families battling childhood cancer,

such as allocating more funds to medical sponsorships for B40 families, envisioning plans for hospital facilities and medical equipment upgrades, expanding our support services and strengthening our corporate partnerships.

FEBRUARY

Participated in International Childhood Cancer Day (ICCD).

Families, caregivers and the healthcare team participated in the Tree of Life campaign, sharing their coloured handprints as a sign of support. The Society also collaborated with Sarawak's Deputy Minister for Public Health, Housing and Local Government, Datuk Michael Tiang, for a public awareness video.



MARCH

Facilitated Mubadala Energy's donation of new essential medical equipment to the paediatric ward at Hospital Bintulu,

refurbishment of the hospital playground as well as the donation of 5 units of air purifiers to SCCS Kuching Halfway Home, contributing a total of RM171,588. By the end of March, SCCS also launched GoBald, our signature annual awareness and fundraising campaign.



APRIL

Celebrated #CCISiblings, an initiative by Childhood Cancer International to recognise the important roles of brothers and sisters in supporting the treatment and healing process of their siblings with cancer.

SCCS interviewed two patients and their siblings, sharing their touching stories of love and support.

MAY

Successfully hosted the 15th Childhood Cancer International (CCI) Asia Conference in May 2023, with the theme "Bridging the Gaps, Better Care and More Cures".

The event was held for the first time in Kuching, Sarawak, welcoming more than 120 advocates from across 17 countries to discuss ways to mobilise more support for children and families affected by childhood cancer in Asia.



JUNE

Successfully wrapped up GoBald 2023, seeing around 165 heads shaved and support from more than 1,600 donors, raising over RM957,000 throughout the entire course of the campaign.

The funds will help to ensure that childhood cancer patients get access to integrated and improved care, treatment and facilities.

JULY

Facilitated the donation of 13 units of medical equipment valued at RM115,167.55 from the Malaysian Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to Sarawak General Hospital (SGH).

The addition of new equipment will contribute to the overall improvement of care for the patients at Paediatric Oncology and Haematology Ward 2A.

OCTOBER

Funded RM35,000 to replace the ageing flooring of the paediatric ward and isolation rooms in Sibuh Hospital.

The ward receives about 80 patients a year and sees 5-10 children a day as outpatients. The new flooring will reduce the risk of fungal infection and provide a safer and more comfortable environment for treatment.

AUGUST

Organised its first Youth Camp in August 2023 after a three-year hiatus. Themed "S.E.L.F.",

About 45 survivors and the medical team from Kuching, Sibuh, Miri and Bintulu spent a weekend at Borneo Happy Farm, participating in holistic initiatives to support, prepare and develop survivors for life after cancer.



NOVEMBER

Celebrated our 22nd anniversary in November, a significant milestone for a charitable association established in 2001.

The final committee meeting of the year was held over the weekend to discuss plans with a focus on improving patient support sustainably, followed by an evening of recognition of SCCS's achievements over the years.



SEPTEMBER

Launched the 'Aisyah Beats Cancer' Balloon Maze in Miri, in conjunction with Childhood Cancer Awareness Month.

The month-long campaign saw a total of 6,241 attendees and a sponsorship and donation of over RM73,000. The maze featured life-sized balloon sculptures detailing the journey of a child diagnosed with cancer for an immersive experience for young visitors and their families.

DECEMBER

As 2023 comes to a close, SCCS recorded an impressive fundraising performance of about RM3.48 million. These funds played a pivotal role in providing financial subsidies to 50+ families, 300+ trips to the hospital, 2,300+ nights stay at Kuching Halfway Home and so much more.

Overall, there were around 3,000 donors this year, ranging from corporate organisations to donors from the Heart of Gold Monthly Donation Program.

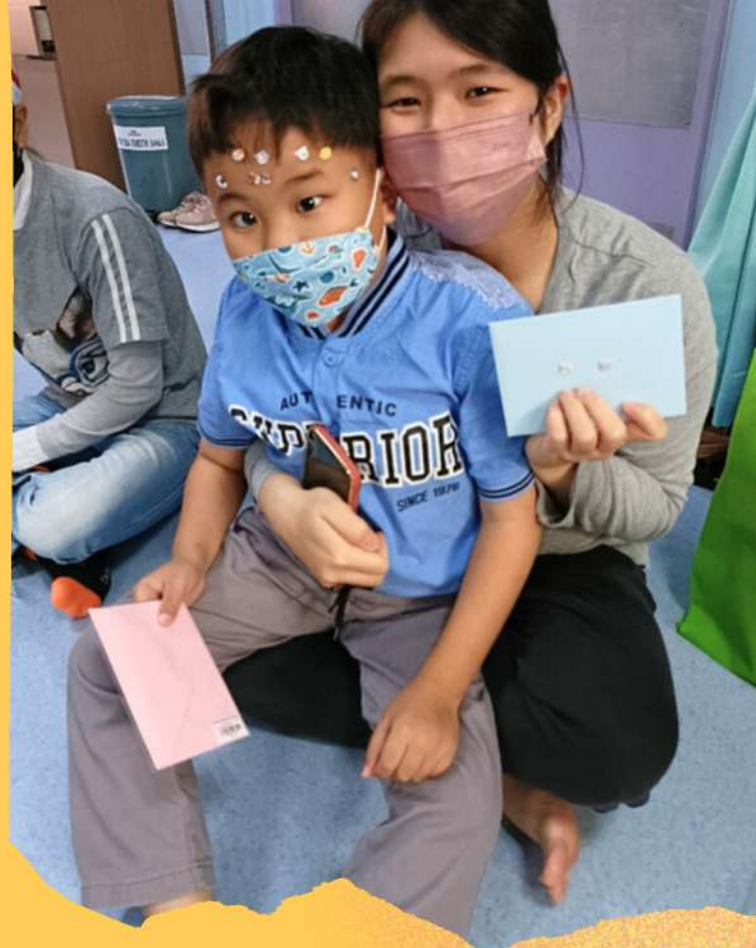


A 4-YEAR CANCER TREATMENT JOURNEY

At only 4 years old, Wesley Ting was diagnosed with an Ependymoma brain tumour. 4 years later, in June 2023, he completed his treatment and is now back home.

For the first time as a mother, I felt real fear for my child's life.

In early 2019, Wesley began experiencing headaches, and his mother noticed he had trouble walking, swaying side to side with unsteady steps. Wesley also had the "lazy eye," with his left eye misaligned. Concerned, his parents took him to the hospital, where scans and tests confirmed his diagnosis.

Wesley's treatment was fraught with challenges. He was unconscious several times due to complications and underwent multiple emergency surgeries, delaying his chemotherapy and radiotherapy.

At one point, Wesley was admitted to the ICU in critical condition with weak breathing and the possibility of not regaining consciousness.

"My world felt like it was collapsing when I heard the news. I wanted to do anything to save my son, but aside from staying strong by his side, I felt helpless."

After many months, Wesley completed his intensive treatment, and the doctor allowed him to go home. The SCCS team held a farewell celebration for Wesley and his mother.

In December, the SCCS team visited Sibu for Clinic Day and Christmas celebrations. Both Wesley and his mother participated in fun activities such as card exchanges, arts and crafts sessions and a crowd favourite - receiving presents!

**Currently, Wesley's condition is still being monitored through regular follow-ups at Sibu Hospital.*

WHAT WE DO

For more than 20 years, SCCS has been continuously working to support and uplift the brave children and families who are battling childhood cancer in Sarawak. We recognise the importance of a solid support system, whether from family, friends, caregivers, medical professionals, our staff, or other families going through the same journey.

To help with the different needs and challenges that come with uncertain times, we take a holistic approach to support children diagnosed with cancer, and their families.

In 2023, SCCS saw the renovation and upgrade of several medical facilities across Sarawak, as well as increased participation with local and international cancer organisations to learn and discuss the latest practices in cancer care. These initiatives along with our pre-established provision of essential care and support services will help us better serve and support our childhood cancer patients.

Access to Treatment Accommodation & Transportation

SCCS ensures childhood cancer patients get access to the necessary treatment by providing free accommodation at its halfway homes and transportation for outstation patients receiving treatment in local government hospitals. This enables patients to focus their energy on completing the required treatment.



In 2023, 2,381 night stays at SCCS Kuching Halfway Home were provided for 37 outstation families undergoing treatment.

Financial Assistance

Monetary assistance is provided to families in need, through the form of monthly financial subsidies, weekly allowances, travel expenses reimbursement, cash and in-kind donations, bereavement assistance and medical subsidies.



In 2023, 51 families received monthly financial subsidies from SCCS amounting to RM109,070 to help ease their financial burden.



Medical Aid

SCCS sponsors medical consumables and donates medical equipment not provided in Sarawak's government hospitals. This includes medications, blood filters, central venous lines and prosthetic devices among others. The Society also subsidises costly medical treatments imperative to the survival of childhood patients, on a need basis.



In 2023, 39 children received medical aid sponsorship from SCCS for procedures, lab tests, and medications totaling RM177,753.



Emotional Support

Parents and caregivers are the pillars of strength and support for children fighting cancer and require a high level of emotional support to navigate through the uncertainties of the cancer journey. SCCS recognises the hardships of caregivers and initiates caring sessions, home visits and distribution of care packs to provide some stress relief.



In 2023, SCCS carried out 616 parent-caring sessions to support 127 parents.

Recreational Activities

To spread happiness and provide a sense of normalcy in life during these challenging times, SCCS organises various fun activities for children and families at the ward and its halfway homes. Children and caregivers get to keep their minds off treatment through activities such as birthday parties, festive celebrations, arts and crafts, and cooking.



In 2023, about 1,208 recreational activities were held to spread joy to about 167 children and 52 caregivers staying at the ward and halfway home.



Palliative and Bereavement Support

While there are many cases of recovery, unfortunately not every child regains their health. SCCS provides bereavement support through monetary donations, caring sessions and home visits to help them through difficult times. The Wishing Star project was also established to grant children their wishes, creating lasting memories with their families.

✦✦ In 2023, 19 families received a condolence donation amounting to RM44,450. A total of 73 palliative care caring sessions were carried out, with 8 wishes granted.



Education Incentives and Survivors Support Group

SCCS continues to instil the importance of education in children to promote self-learning and development while encouraging children to continue striving for excellence in life. Education incentives are given to students achieving excellence in academic studies to recognise their hard work.

✦✦ The "Heroes of Hope" support group was formed by childhood cancer survivors to connect & support one another in this journey.



Public Awareness

A heightened public awareness of childhood cancer will help to promote early detection, diagnosis and effective treatment. It will also help to garner more support for the mission of SCCS, enabling the extension of its essential services and care to more children.

✦✦ In 2023, SCCS participated in two public awareness talks, sharing its journey and mission in helping kids and families fight cancer. Every year, the Society also initiates awareness and engagement activities during International Childhood Cancer Day and Childhood Cancer Awareness Month to build up community and camaraderie to support the little fighters.



BROADENING COLLABORATIVE EFFORTS

with International Organisations

Childhood Cancer International (CCI)

The SCCS staff and committee members attended the Childhood Cancer International (CCI) Conference in Ottawa, Canada in October 2023. As the largest patient support organisation for childhood cancer globally, the CCI conference is a platform for childhood cancer organisations from across the globe to share knowledge and best practices to advance the care and support of childhood cancer patients.

There, our team had the opportunity to speak with highly established non-profit organisations such as St Jude Children's Research Hospital from the US and CHOC Childhood Cancer Foundation South Africa on ways to help young patients better understand the treatment procedures to reduce trauma and improve emotional support services for children and their caregivers.



Childhood Cancer International Asia

In May, SCCS launched Sarawak's first Childhood Cancer International, Asia Conference in Kuching, organised in collaboration with CCI Asia.

Themed "Bridging the Gaps, Better Care and More Cures", the two-day conference saw the participation of over 120 delegates from across 17 countries, including Lebanon, India, Malaysia, Hong Kong, Philippines, Korea and Japan.

Childhood cancer organisations, support groups, medical teams, families and survivors in Asia converged to discuss how stakeholders can work together to advance greater access to care and support for children and families affected by childhood cancer, over 13 discussion topics.

AISYAH BEATS CANCER

BALLOON MAZE 2023



In conjunction with Childhood Cancer Awareness Month (CCAM), observed globally every September, SCCS organised the 'Aisyah Beats Cancer' Balloon Maze at Miri, Sarawak, to increase public awareness of childhood cancer while celebrating the resilience and courage of all childhood cancer patients.

The balloon maze featured life-sized balloon sculptures and a 1,596 sqft maze inspired by the true story of a young cancer fighter, Aisyah. Visitors enjoyed a creative retelling of her journey and challenges of being diagnosed with cancer, from symptom detection, official diagnosis, and active treatment, to being in remission and survivorship.

Amongst the highlights of the maze include a QR code for visitors to scan to watch a video clip of Aisyah sharing her

life after cancer, her dream and her encouragement to all childhood cancer patients, as well as a Barbie-inspired balloon photobooth, Aisyah's favourite cartoon character. By completing a quiz, visitors also had a chance to win a surprise gift at the end of the maze.

More than 6,200 people attended the event, with total sponsorship and donations amounting to over RM73,000.

As SCCS' signature fundraising campaign, GoBald is held annually to raise funds to support kids and families in their cancer-fighting journey while increasing childhood cancer awareness. GoBald has raised more than RM11 million since the campaign was first introduced in 2009, gathering support from over 10,000 participants across Malaysia in the last 14 years.

The 2023 campaign was the first campaign to resume physical events since the pandemic, where participants get to shave in front of a live audience at two public events in Kuching and Miri.

A total of three satellite shaves involving local organisations, societies and learning institutions were also held, collectively raising more than RM253,700.

Overall, the 2023 campaign was a huge success, raising over RM950,00 from more than 3,000 donors, with over 200 sign-ups by the end of 2023. All donations raised from GoBald contribute about 20% to 30% of SCCS's total expenditure of almost RM2 million every year.



FUNDRAISING & DONATIONS

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As a non-profit organisation, SCCS' operations and services are primarily funded through donations by members of the public. With continuous support from loyal donors, committed partners and the generous community, SCCS can help 150 to 200 families in Sarawak affected by childhood cancer, every year.

The donations received ensure that SCCS continues to provide essential support services in order to make a positive impact in the lives of families in need. 2023 marked the highest fundraising milestone for SCCS, with a majority of contributions coming from corporate donations, Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) projects and GoBald.

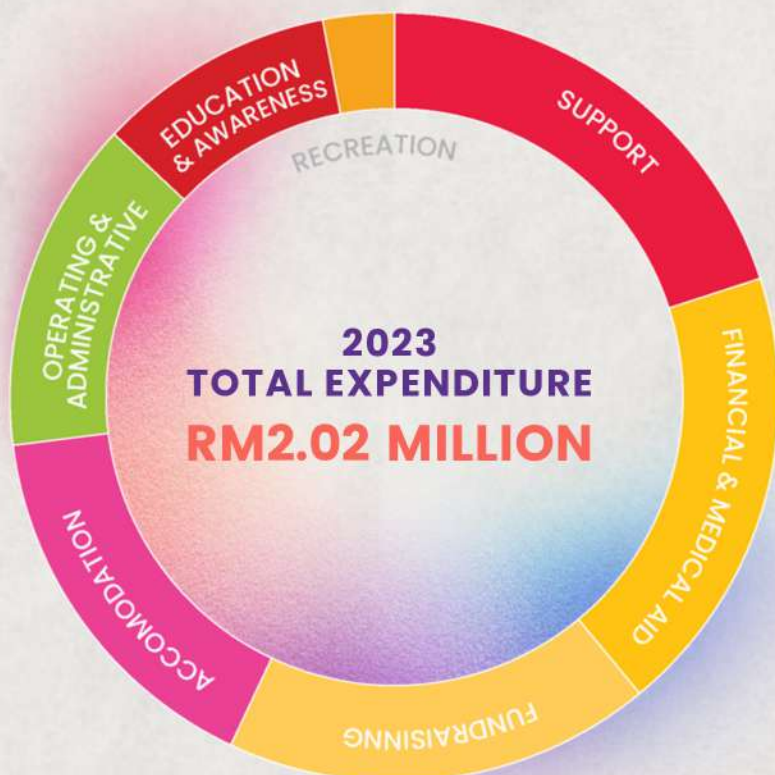

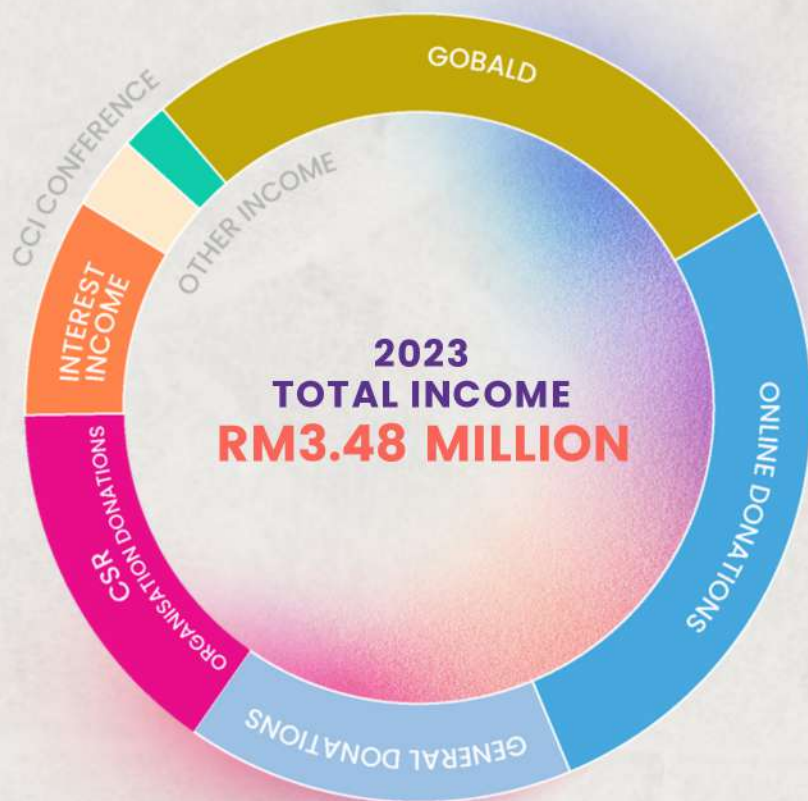

What's next for SCCS? As SCCS continues our work of providing accessible cancer treatment to all children across Sarawak, 2024 is also a year where we seek to explore new territories of research, outreach and collaboration.



ENHANCING PATIENT CARE THROUGH SPECIALISED MEDICAL SUPPORT

In 2024, significant sponsorships of high-cost medical aids are in the works as SCCS endeavours to provide optimum cancer treatments for childhood cancer patients, setting aside a planned budget of more than RM900k.



BROADENING OUR COLLABORATIVE EFFORTS WITH NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL ORGANISATIONS

SCCS actively collaborates with Childhood Cancer Malaysia (CCM) and Childhood Cancer International (CCI) to stay updated on advancements, promote continuous learning, and exchange best practices with support groups.



IMPROVE EDUCATION AND OUTREACH

Introducing two new services: the "Back to School" program, supporting the reintegration of school-going patients, and the "Patient and Caregiver Education" program, for newly diagnosed children and caregivers to better prepare for the treatment process.

SCCS will initiate research on the quality of life of leukaemia survivors in Sarawak, resulting in statistics that shed light on the impact of healthcare interventions and influencing clinical decision-making for future patients.
