As we reflect on the year that was, I am deeply moved by the unwavering spirit, strength, and solidarity that continue to define the Sarawak Children's Cancer Society (SCCS). 2024 has been a year of growth, impact, and renewed purpose – and it is because of every one of you who has walked this journey with us.

At SCCS, our mission remains clear: no child should face cancer alone.

In 2024, we provided over RM480,000 for urgent, life-saving treatments for children.

This contributed to a total medical aid spending of more than RM760,000 and brought our overall expenses to RM2.9 million—a 43% increase from 2023.

These numbers represent more than just funds; they represent lives saved, crises met with timely care, and families finding hope in their darkest moments.

In September, we brought the “Samuel Beats Cancer” Balloon Maze to Sibu for the first time, which reached thousands, and in November, we reintroduced our SCCS Memorial Day, offering families a space for remembrance and healing. Through these efforts, we continue to strengthen our community, creating spaces where courage, resilience, and hope shine through.

In addition to our events, we made significant improvements to our services, including our Back to School initiative, which helped young patients return to their studies with confidence, and the development of educational materials for families and caregivers. Every program, every initiative, is designed to ensure that the journey through childhood cancer is not walked alone.

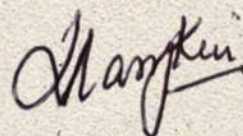

For more than 20 years, SCCS has been continuously working to support and uplift the brave children and families who are battling childhood cancer in Sarawak.

We recognise the importance of a solid support system, whether from family, friends, caregivers, medical professionals, our staff, or other families going through the same journey. To help with the different needs and challenges that come with uncertain times, we take a holistic approach to support children diagnosed with cancer and their families.

Access to Treatment -

Accommodation & Transportation

SCCS ensures childhood cancer patients get access to the necessary treatment by providing free accommodation at its halfway homes and transportation for outstation patients receiving treatment in local government hospitals. This enables patients to focus their energy on completing the required treatment.





Financial Assistance

Monetary assistance is provided to families in need, through the form of monthly financial subsidies, weekly allowances, travel expenses reimbursement, cash and in-kind donations, bereavement assistance and medical subsidies.



Emotional Support

The cancer treatment journey impacts the lives of not only the patients but also their caregivers, family members, medical professionals and many more. SCCS recognises the need to maintain and improve the emotional well-being of everyone involved through initiating counselling and caring sessions, home visits, distribution of care packs and more to provide encouragement and support.



Medical Aid

SCCS sponsors medical consumables and donates medical equipment not provided in Sarawak's government hospitals. This includes medications, blood filters, central venous lines and prosthetic devices among others. The Society also subsidises costly medical treatments imperative to the survival of childhood patients, on a need basis.



Recreational Activities

To spread happiness and provide a sense of normalcy in life during these challenging times, SCCS organises various fun activities for children and families at the ward and its halfway home centre. Children and caregivers get to keep their minds off treatment through activities such as birthday parties, festive celebrations, arts and crafts, and cooking.



Palliative and Bereavement Support

While there are many cases of recovery, unfortunately not every child regains their health. SCCS provides bereavement support through monetary donations, caring sessions and home visits to help them through difficult times. The Wishing Star project was also established to grant children their wishes, creating lasting memories with their families.



Education Incentives and Survivors Support Group

SCCS continues to instil the importance of education in children to promote self-learning and development while encouraging children to continue striving for excellence in life. Education incentives are given to students achieving excellence in academic studies to recognise their hard work.

The "Heroes of Hope" support group was formed by childhood cancer survivors to connect and support one another in this journey.



Public Awareness

A heightened public awareness of childhood cancer promotes early detection, diagnosis, and effective treatment, while garnering greater support for SCCS' mission. Through initiatives like GoBald, International Childhood Cancer Day, and Childhood Cancer Awareness Month, SCCS continue to build community and inspire support for our young fighters.

Jessie, a 4-year-old girl from Sarikei was diagnosed with Stage 4 Neuroblastoma. In 2023, SCCS fully sponsored essential lab tests and scans to enable Jessie to undergo a bone marrow transplant at the Hospital Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (HUKM) in Kuala Lumpur. **In February 2024, SCCS sponsored over RM320,000 for Jessie's immunotherapy treatment at the Sarawak General Hospital.**

Daniel

Daniel, a 14-year-old-boy from Kuching, was diagnosed with T-cell Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia, or T Lymphoblastic Leukaemia (T-ALL). **On 26 March 2024, Daniel received a stem cell transplant at Ampang Hospital, Selangor. SCCS supported Daniel's treatment costs totalling over RM130,000 for the stem cell transplant and lab tests performed at both Sarawak General Hospital in Kuching and Ampang Hospital in Selangor.**

In 2018, Ambrose was diagnosed with osteosarcoma at age 10 and later received an endoprosthesis in his right leg. When it broke in early 2024, **SCCS sponsored a surgery on 22 February to replace it with a larger implant suited to his growth.** The procedure, held at Sarawak General Hospital, cost over RM35,000.

CCM brings together seven childhood cancer support groups from across Malaysia, united by a shared mission to raise awareness and advocate for improved care at the national level. The Coalition focuses on:

- Enhancing access to quality treatment and care
- Providing holistic support to patients and families
- Strengthening the capacity of member organisations

These goals are pursued through collaboration, knowledge sharing, and joint initiatives — in alignment with the vision of Childhood Cancer International (CCI), a global network representing over 180 parent organisations, survivor associations, and cancer societies across more than 90 countries.

SCCS's active involvement in CCM complements our own mission to improve the quality of life for children with cancer and their families throughout Sarawak and beyond.

SCCS continues to play an integral role within CCI. Jodie Sim contributes as a member of the CCI Asia Regional Committee and serves as Co-Chair of the Asia Regional Conference.

Our team actively participates in CCI-led activities such as conferences, training programmes, and exchange visits with other member organisations. These engagements enable us to adopt international best practices and tailor them to local needs — helping us bridge service gaps and expand the support available to childhood cancer patients and caregivers in Sarawak.

GoBald, SCCS's flagship annual fundraising campaign, is a cornerstone of the Society's efforts to raise funds and support families on their cancer-fighting journey while increasing awareness about childhood cancer.

Since its inception in 2009, GoBald has raised over RM11 million, with more than 10,000 participants nationwide joining the cause over the past 15 years.

The GoBald 2024 campaign, launched on March 24th and running until the end of June, featured two public shaving events in Kuching and Miri, where participants shaved their heads in solidarity with children undergoing cancer treatment.

The campaign achieved remarkable success, garnering over RM 781,556.80 and inspiring 294 individuals to shave their heads by the end of 2024. Contributions from GoBald fund about 20% to 30% of SCCS's annual operating costs, which amount to over RM2 million.



In 2024, 3 satellite shaves were organised in collaboration with local organisations, schools, and societies, bringing GoBald to their communities. These mini-events raised over RM173,000 to support GoBald and fund hospital upgrades in Sarawak.

In May, the **Miri Golf Club** hosted a golf tournament with 78 participants, alongside the first GoBald 2024 satellite shave. Led by Madam Ku Chui Tee and Miss Tammy Esaw, 12 others joined the shave, raising over RM36,000 with support from YB Datuk Sebastian Ting Chiew Yew, Sarawak Deputy Minister of Tourism, Creative Industries and Performing Arts (Tourism).



In August, **Grolite Group** in Sibul raised RM77,000 through a blood donation drive and satellite shave, where 27 individuals, including Sibul Hospital Director Dr. Nanthakumar, shaved their heads. RM39,000 was used to purchase medical equipment for the paediatric ward at Sibul Hospital, with the rest supporting the September Balloon Maze.

In October, **RHB Bank** conducted a satellite shave at the SCCS Halfway Home in Kuching, raising RM58,000. 11 staff members courageously shaved their heads. From the total raised, RM49,000 was dedicated to procuring critical medical equipment for the Paediatric Oncology Ward at Sarawak General Hospital.



'SAMUEL BEATS CANCER' BALLOON MAZE 2024

In September, SCCS marked Childhood Cancer Awareness Month with the 'Samuel Beats Cancer' Balloon Maze, held in Sibu, Sarawak for the first time. This popular event, which has been a hallmark of SCCS' awareness initiatives for several years, showcased life-sized balloon sculptures that depicted the inspiring real-life journey of Samuel, who was diagnosed with cancer at just three and a half years old.

The event aimed to raise awareness of childhood cancer while celebrating the strength, courage, and resilience of young cancer patients. Through its creative design, the maze symbolised the twists, turns, uncertainties, and triumphs experienced by childhood cancer survivors.

The launch was officiated by Sarawak Deputy Minister for Public Health, Housing, and Local Government II, YB Datuk Michael Tiang. Over three days, the event welcomed more than 8,000 attendees and successfully raised over RM14,000 to support SCCS' mission.





#GOLDENTRUTH DIGITAL CAMPAIGN

Also part of Childhood Cancer Awareness Month, SCCS launched the #GoldenTruth Campaign, a three-part video series featuring candid and heartfelt conversations between parents of children with cancer and those without. These discussions shed light on the realities of the childhood cancer treatment journey, fostering empathy and understanding within the community.

The campaign's three videos were released weekly throughout September, targeting online audiences to broaden awareness of childhood cancer. This first-ever digital campaign garnered an impressive 699,000 views on Facebook, highlighting its widespread reach and impact.



The SCCS Survivors Youth Camp 2024 was held in September, in conjunction with Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. Centered on the theme “Breakthrough: Breaking Barriers, Unleashing Potential,” the camp encouraged participants to step out of their comfort zones and discover their inner strengths.

Spanning three days and two nights, the camp brought together approximately 65 participants, including 34 cancer survivors from Kuching, Sibul, Bintulu, Miri, and special guests from YASKA Brunei. Older survivors returned as volunteers, sharing their personal journeys and guiding their peers, fostering a deeply supportive and inspiring environment.



The Youth Camp was made possible in part through a generous USD 5,000 (approximately RM23,500) grant from the MDRT Foundation.

A standout session featured a childhood cancer survivor who shared his remarkable journey from being diagnosed as a teenager to becoming a corporate trainer and a proud father, offering a story of hope and perseverance.

Complemented by interactive activities and group discussions, the camp aimed to empower young survivors and their families with practical knowledge, encouragement, and the tools to navigate life after cancer.





In November, SCCS hosted its first Memorial Day since 2019, bringing together 18 families from across Sarawak at the SCCS Kuching Halfway Home to honour and remember the children who lost their battle with cancer.

The event featured moving tributes from SCCS staff, committee members, medical professionals, and, most poignantly, bereaved families. Through heartfelt reflections, families shared their experiences of profound loss—of a child, a sibling, a companion—fostering a sense of shared understanding and solidarity.

Memorial Day provided a safe and supportive space for families to connect, offer encouragement to one another, and navigate their grief together. The gathering also served as a platform for emotional expression, helping participants process their feelings in a compassionate community.

Aligned with SCCS' ongoing commitment to supporting families through post-bereavement care, Memorial Day stands as a vital initiative to ensure these families continue to feel seen, supported, and cared for, even after their most difficult losses.



**Over RM262,000 invested in Hospital
Upgrades and Medical Equipment**

Petroleum Sarawak Berhad (PETROS) donated a new ultrasound machine to SGH's Paediatric Ward 2A, improving procedure accuracy and patient comfort. Facilitated by SCCS, this marks a valuable step in enhancing care for young patients.



Thanks to the generous support from **Grolite Group and the Sibu community**, over RM39,000 was raised for the purchase of essential medical equipment for the Paediatric Ward at Sibu Hospital—enhancing care and comfort for young patients in the region.

RHB Touch Hearts 2024 raised RM49,860 to support the paediatric oncology ward at SGH and paediatric ward at Miri Hospital. The funds will help purchase vital medical equipment to enhance treatment experiences for young cancer patients in these hospitals.



OCBC Bank (Malaysia) Berhad donated essential medical equipment worth RM23,750 to the Paediatric Oncology Ward at SGH, supporting young patients, especially those with nutrition challenges, and enhancing overall care and comfort.

SCCS allocated RM50,390 for upgrades to the Paediatric Oncology Ward at SGH, including a washing machine and dryer, water purifier, water heaters, and air conditioners, all aimed at enhancing the treatment experience for young cancer patients.





AED Training. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints donated an AED machine worth RM8,000 to the SCCS centre in Kuching. A training session was held to ensure staff are prepared to handle emergencies, enhancing the safety and well-being of both residents and staff.

Fire Drill. A fire drill was conducted at SCCS Halfway Home, where residents participated in an engaging and educational experience. The children had the opportunity to explore a fire truck while staff demonstrated basic fire safety procedures and proper hydrant use.



Playroom Upgrade. The walls of the SCCS Halfway Home Kuching playroom were installed with new cabinets, significantly increasing storage space, allowing SCCS to better serve the needs of patients and staff.

Staff Team Building. Despite the team's varied schedules and locations, team-building remains essential to staying connected and working effectively together. Strong communication and relationships are important to provide the best care and support for the children and their families.





AFANOC - Barcelona

As part of our efforts to enhance the services and living spaces for patients and caregivers at our halfway home, our Executive Director, along with the Halfway Home and Finance Manager, visited AFANOC, an NGO in Barcelona that operates a halfway home. Additionally, learning visits were conducted at two hospitals in Barcelona to gain further insights.

National Cancer Society Malaysia (NCSM)

The SCCS Support Services team visited the National Cancer Society Malaysia to gain insights into their patient care practices. The visit highlighted the effectiveness of structured volunteer training through a patient navigator program, aimed at identifying patient needs, as well as the positive impact of one-on-one play therapy sessions in providing children with a safe space for emotional expression.



CCI Asia

SCCS marked a key milestone at the 16th CCI Asia Conference, with Executive Director Jodie Sim co-chairing for the first time. The team shared insights on the Caregivers Support Group, joined the Enlace mentorship initiative to strengthen peer learning, and had a survivor representative join the new CCI Asia Survivors Network. The conference offered valuable perspectives to help us better support children with cancer in Sarawak.





Hair for Hope, CCF Singapore

SCCS visited Hair for Hope 2024—Singapore's signature head-shaving fundraiser by the Children's Cancer Foundation. The team gained valuable insights into organising large-scale awareness events and strengthened ties with like-minded organisations, reinforcing our shared commitment to ensuring no child or family faces cancer alone.

Childhood Cancer International (CCI)

SCCS attended the 30th CCI Annual Conference in Honolulu, where global disparities in childhood cancer care were discussed. Insights from the conference will be instrumental in developing future programs. The SCCS team participated in workshops on fundraising, grief, and survivor support, and explored introducing new play therapy tools.



Patient Navigation

To ensure more children and families receive timely support, SCCS introduces our services to various hospital departments through our Patient Navigation initiative. By connecting with medical teams across units, we aim to raise awareness of how we can assist young patients and their families throughout their cancer journey.



Patient Education

SCCS uses photos, videos, slides and educational play tools to help children understand cancer treatment in a fun and simple way. We explain procedures like blood tests, chemo, and vaccinations to ease fear and build confidence.

Awareness Talks

SCCS conducts awareness talks at schools and corporations to educate the public about childhood cancer, including its early signs and symptoms, while also introducing our services and how the community can support our mission.



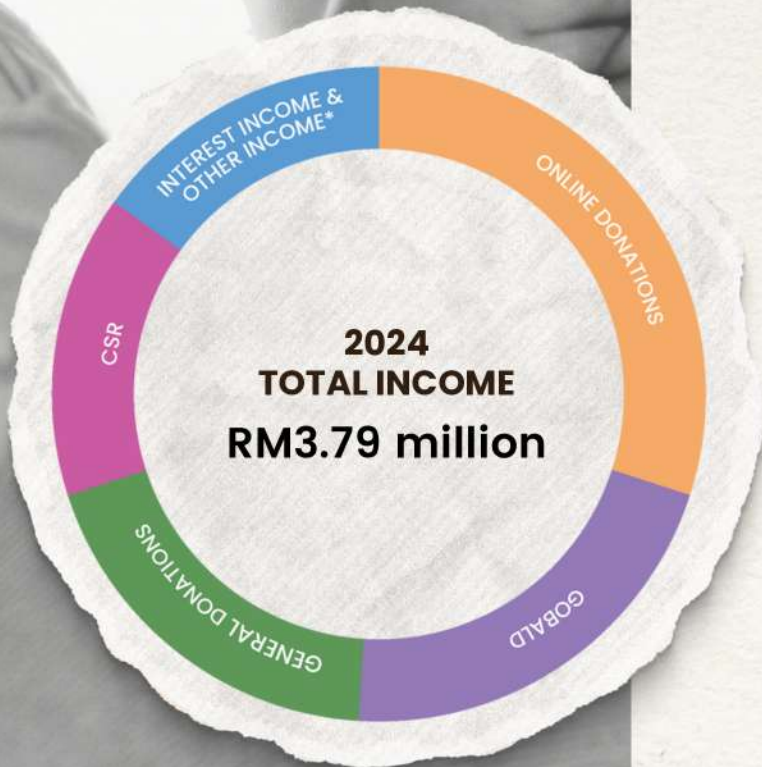
Roadshows
